and imbibed much of the abolition philosophy of the reformer. He entered politics in Kentucky and was elected to the legislature. On June 3, 1845 he issued at Lexington the first number of The True American, an anti-slavery paper. Threatened by mob violence he fortified his office with two four pounder brass cannon, loaded and mounted them breast high in his office, wore a bowie-knife and kept a brace of pistols in the mouth of his grip sack which he kept at his feet by his desk.
