Sponsored by the Black Heritage Trail of NH and The Harriet Wilson Project. Harriet E. Wilson, a native of Milford, wrote the pre-Civil War

novel, *Our Nig*, which is believed to be the first novel by an African American woman to be published in the United States. Originally published anonymously in 1859, the autobiographical novel *Our Nig* fell into obscurity. When noted at all, it was assumed its author was white. Henry Louis Gates Jr., a Harvard professor, historian, filmmaker, and MacArthur Fellow, re-discovered the novel, documented its true author, and republished it, with Harriet Wilson's name, in 1983.
