 Why Early A.A. Succeeded
 In the Alcoholics Anonymous trilogy of revered figures, many people would name Clarence Snyder after Bill W. and Dr. Bob. Snyder chaired the first meeting known as Alcoholics Anonymous, coined the term AA, advocated opening meetings to women (something that Bill W. and Dr. Bob hesitated to do), and established the organization's first newsletter. Snyder outlined his story in "Home Brewmeister", which appears in all three editions of Alcoholics Anonymous. One of the AA members he sponsored was Mitchell K., whose book presents an intimate portrait of this pioneer of recovery. Born in 1902 in Cleveland, Ohio, Snyder began drinking as a teen to conceal childhood feelings of inferiority. When his wife, Dorothy, was prescribed ale for a difficult pregnancy, Snyder brewed it and drank it himself. His addiction eventually cost him his job as a financier, forcing him to live life "on the bum". After regaining sobriety in 1938, Snyder became an ace car salesman, using his two demonstrator cars to ferry "rummies" to Oxford Group meetings, which helped build Cleveland's recovery population. *A Biography of Clarence Snyder* exemplifies how the lives of people in recovery intertwine. The brother-in-law of Snyder's sister-in-law's doctor was Bill W., who recommended that Snyder see Dr. Bob Smith. Other memorable points: Snyder's first sponsorship; the controversy involving the Roman Catholic Church, which threatened to excommunicate Oxford Group members; the struggles of financing the Big Book's printing; and more. *A Biography of Clarence Snyder* is immensely readable (especially in this newly edited version), while capturing the flavor of the Big Book.

Transforming the Workforce for Children Birth Through

Early childhood can be a time of rich discovery, a period when educators have an opportunity to harness their students' fascination to create unique learning opportunities. Some teachers engage with their students' ideas in ways that make learning collaborative—but not all students have access to these kinds of learning environments. In *Segregation by Experience*, the authors filmed and studied a first-grade classroom led by a Black immigrant teacher who encouraged her diverse group of students to exercise their agency. When the researchers showed the film to other schools, everyone struggled. Educators admired the teacher but didn't think her practices would work with their own Black and brown students. Parents of color—many of them immigrants—liked many of the practices, but worried that they would compromise their children. And the young children who viewed the film thought that the kids in the film were terrible, loud, and badly behaved; they told the authors that learning was supposed to be quiet, still, and obedient. In *Segregation by Experience* Jennifer Keys Adair and Kiyomi Sánchez-Suzuki Colegrove show us just how much our expectations of children of color affect what and how they learn at school, and they ask us to consider which children get to have sophisticated, dynamic learning experiences at school and which children are denied such experiences because of our continued racist assumptions about them.

Do Christians need recovery? Or is recovery something needed by the church itself? Addiction—whether to a substance or to a behavior—is a problem within faith communities, just like it is everywhere else. But because churches are rarely experienced as safe places for dealing with addiction, co-addiction, or the legacy of family dysfunction, Christians tend to seek recovery from these conditions in Twelve-Step fellowships. Once they become accustomed to the ethos of vulnerability, acceptance, and healing that these fellowships provide, however, they are often left feeling that the church has failed them, with many asking: why can't church be more like an AA meeting? Inspired by his own quest to find in church the sort of mutual support and healing he discovered in Twelve-Step fellowships, Stephen Haynes explores the history of Alcoholics Anonymous and its relationship to American Christianity. He shows that, while AA eventually separated from the Christian parachurch movement out of which it emerged, it retained aspects of Christian experience that the church itself has largely lost: comfort with brokenness and vulnerability, an emphasis on honesty and transparency, and suspicion toward claims to piety and respectability. Haynes encourages Christians to reclaim these distinctive elements of the Twelve-Step movement in the process of "recovering church." He argues that this process must begin with he calls "Step 0," which, as he knows from personal experience, can be the hardest step: the admission that, despite appearances, we are not fine.

The Dictionary of Early American Philosophers, which contains over 400 entries by nearly 300 authors, provides an account of philosophical thought in the United States and Canada between 1600 and 1860.
