When Stewart returned home, still unmarried, he once again moved in with Fonda, his wife, and his two children, Jane and Peter, who knew him as Uncle Jimmy. He found a home in the tenements of New York and for the next fifty years he devoted his life to the struggles of fellow Jewish workers.
