Philip Roth—the first of its kind—that takes on the man, the myth, and the work Philip Roth is one of the most renowned writers of our time. From his debut, *Goodbye, Columbus*, which won the National Book Award in 1960, and the explosion of Portnoy's *Complaint* in 1969 to his haunting reimagining of Anne Frank's story in *The Ghost Writer* ten years later and the series of masterworks starting in the mid-eighties—*The Counterlife*, *Patrimony*, *Operation Shylock*, *Sabbath's Theater*, *American Pastoral*, *The Human Stain*—Roth has produced some of the great American literature of the modern era. disquiet, a book that evoked existential dread, but contained it, beautifully, like a shipwreck in a bottle.”
 —Margaret Talbot, The New Yorker A taut, gripping tale of a young woman and an Iron Age reenactment trip that unearths frightening behavior The light blinds you; there’s a lot you miss by gathering at the fireside. In the north of England, far from the intrusions of

cities but not far from civilization, Silvie and her family are living as if they are ancient Britons, surviving by the tools and knowledge of the Iron Age. For two weeks, the length of her father’s vacation, they join an anthropology course set to reenact life in simpler times. They are surrounded by forests of birch and rowan; they make stew from foraged roots and hunted rabbit.

The students are fulfilling their coursework; Silvie's father is fulfilling his lifelong obsession. He has raised her on stories of early man, taken her to witness rare artifacts, recounted time and again their rituals and beliefs—particularly their sacrifices to the bog. Mixing with the students, Silvie begins to see, hear, and imagine another kind of life, one that might include going to university,

traveling beyond England, choosing her own clothes and food, speaking her mind. The ancient Britons built ghost walls to ward off enemy invaders, rude barricades of stakes topped with ancestral skulls. When the group builds one of their own, they find a spiritual connection to the past. What comes next but human sacrifice? A story at once mythic and strikingly timely, Sarah

Moss's *Ghost Wall* urges us to wonder how far we have come from the "primitive minds" of our ancestors.
