Jackson first entered a recording studio in November 1967, just three months after his ninth birthday. Two years later, with his brothers, he scored his first no.1 single, I Want You Back. Since then, solo and with his brothers, Michael has achieved an incredible one hundred Top 40 Singles, sixty Top 40 Albums and fifteen Top 40 Music Videos. He has also contributed to numerous other hit

singles, including We Are The World, Somebody's Watching Me and State Of Independence, and THRILLER is widely acknowledged as the world's no.1 best-selling album of all-time. For the purposes of this book, to qualify as a Top 40 hit, a single, album or music video must have entered the Top 40 chart in at least one of the featured countries. The Top 40 hits are detailed chronologically, according
