Distracted by the ensuing modernization of its traditional services,

however, it failed to transition from paper mail to email, which prescient observers saw as its logical next step. Now the post office is at a crossroads. Other important topics include the unstoppable growth of e-commerce and the implications for delivery market; solutions for the "last mile", and the associated challenges in terms of sustainability. Chapters also discuss traditional

topics for postal and delivery sectors, such as the competitive dynamics in the sector, the business strategies of postal operators, as	well as the definition and funding of the Universal Service Obligation. This book will be a useful tool not only for graduate students and professors	interested in postal and regulatory economics, but also for postal administration s, consulting firms, and federal government departments.
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
