 sharply observant girls, who arrive in the  
 Congo with racial preconceptions forged in  
 1950s Georgia, will be marked in  
 surprisingly different ways by their father's  
 intractable mission, and by Africa itself.  
 Ultimately each must strike her own  
 separate path to salvation. Their  
 passionately intertwined stories become a  
 compelling exploration of moral risk and
