preaching better more consistently. Written with the practicing homilist in mind, *Making Good Preaching Better* helps motivate and sharpen the skills of those in preaching ministry. He believes that requiring novices to prepare whole homilies for criticism presents too many possibilities for failure and thus discouragement. With its step-by-step homiletical exercises, *Making Good Preaching Better* gives students greater possibilities of the joy of success in putting

together entire homilies - one step at a time. Making Good Preaching Better offers three-minute oral exercises to be performed before a video camera. Each exercise uses the theological/homiletical principles explained in that chapter and includes suggestions on how to conduct the video lab sessions without provoking dread but rather, by promoting affirmation. Fourteen homilies (by the author and others) are supplied for both professionals and novices to critique. To supplement the instruction, recommendations for additional readings are provided at the end of each chapter.
