"This work presents findings gained from primarily qualitative observations of 49 parent-child dyads reading print and e-books from various genres. Repeated book reading by parent and preschool aged child is believed to lead to a common shared reading script, which facilitates the reading partners' future interactions around books. It is not known whether the routines

acquired in print book reading readily transfer to dyads' interactions around electronic books (e-books), or whether co-reading these media requires a somewhat different approach. In chapter one, methodological aspects that were common to the three studies constituting the research project are outlined. In chapter two, I examine attempts of parental teaching about word meaning and story elements, as well as use of inferential talk going beyond concrete story content. It is concluded that certain verbal strategies by parents (e.g., a renegotiation of each reader's role, parallel talk) are a necessary prerequisite for dyad members' synchronized interactions with e-books, which in turn benefits their co-construction of meaning from stories. With chapter three, I describe the differences between typically developing (TD) children and those with language impairment (LI) regarding their general and verbal engagement in sharing print and e-books. While the e-book under investigation supported all children's general engagement, children with LI displayed reduced

verbal engagement when sharing it with a parent in comparison to children in the TD group. In chapter four, I focus on the LI group, particularly potential changes in parents' reading strategies and child language with print and e-books following a dialogic reading intervention that focused solely on print books. Two main results were observed. First, parents' use of dialogic questions and completion prompts appeared amplified with the e-book at first read; use of these was moderated at the second read, post-intervention. Second, their children produced longer utterances when sharing the e-book after the intervention when compared to e-book sharing prior to the intervention. Collectively, these results suggest that shared e-reading, at least in part, requires strategies that are different from print book reading, which should be addressed when counseling parents."
